Background on speakers:

Scott Burns is an Associate Professor at Portland State University in the geology department. He has been teaching 26 years and this is his 7th at Portland State. He has a BS and MS from Stanford University and a Ph.D. from the University of Colorado. Tom and Dorian Kuper are principals with David Newton and Associates in Portland and have been with the company since 1990. Both Tom and Dorian are registered geologists and CEG's, not only in Oregon but five other states. Both were our program chairs for the Oregon Section from 1991-1993. Tom has a BS degree from San Diego State University in geology. He has been practicing for 21 years. Dorian has a BS degree from Santa Barbara and an MS degree from San Diego State. She has been practicing for 16 years.

ABSTRACT

The three speakers got a chance to attend the 8th International Conference and Field Trip on Landslide which was help in September in Spain. They got a chance to view many landslides during their field trip from Madrid to Andorra to Barcelona to Valencia to Granada. They interacted with over 35 landslide specialists from around the world in viewing some spectacular landslides. They will discuss case histories concentrating on mechanisms and mitigations. They have case histories on castle stabilizations, highway failures, debris flows, dam failures, beach cliff failures, snow avalanches, and megaslides mistaken for glacial cirques. You are invited to come and enjoy a fun evening!

Report on the National AEG Meeting in New Jersey Last Month

The meeting had low attendance (117 full attendees, 17 students, 57 day attendees, and 34 spouses). The local committee lost \$15,000 on the meeting which does not help the national AEG! They did have one successful short course on GIS even though only 9 people showed up. The four field trips were all successful averaging about 30 people on each. I enjoyed the one to the Franklin mines where I collected some fluorescent minerals. The luncheons and banquets had high attendance too. Sue D'Agnese was the speaker at the Women in AEG breakfast and did a fine juggling act (ask her about that one!). 84 papers were presented and many were very interesting. They had lots of small technical problems and they had no engineering geology award for the opening ceremony. We have proposed the west side light rail tunnel for our award next year and will vote on this at the next meeting. One of the big problems for low attendance was that the registration and abstracts came out only one to two weeks before the meeting. They did have a great continental breakfast each morning which brought everyone together in the morning and provided an audience for the early speakers. Gary Peterson made a great presentation about our meeting to the board. Ken Walsh made a super presentation on the geology of the west side light rail tunnel. I presented a paper on the landslides in Portland in February. Overall, the week went well.


