PRESENTATION: JOHNSON CREEK LANDSLIDE GEOTECHNICAL INVESTIGATION

The Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries (DOGAMI) maintains programs aimed at the understanding, safety awareness and economic impacts of Oregon's coastal processes. In collaboration with the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), Landslide Technology was retained by DOGAMI to manage the Johnson Creek Landslide geotechnical investigation, to analyze the landslide causative factors, and to develop conceptual options to remediate the landslide movement. The investigation was performed from Nov. 2002 through June 2003. DOGAMI continues to monitor and collect data on the conditions of the landslide.

The investigation of Johnson Creek Landslide provides an understanding of the mechanics of the slide and the relationship between ground movement, groundwater fluctuations, precipitation, bluff erosion and beach sand movement. The slide is a complex translational-

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type slide that is approximately 200 meters (660 feet) (east-west) and 400 meters (1300 feet) wide (north-south), and up to 27 meters (90)feet) thick. Slide geometry movement and appears to controlled bv bedding within the

Astoria Formation, which is tilted about 17 degrees to the west.

Johnson Creek Landslide is marginally stable and moves when groundwater levels rise to a threshold that can be reached during winter storms. During the study period, precipitation amounts of 55 to 60-mm (2.2 to 2.4 inches) over a 24-hour period triggered movement.



Compared to groundwater fluctuation, typical rates of erosion and beach sand movement have marginal impacts on the stability of Johnson Creek Landslide. However, based on the slide mechanism, without erosion of the coastal bluff, the stability of the slide would reach equilibrium and movement would

With stabilization and cost consideration, buttressing would be a preferential option; however, it has a significant environmental impact. would be ineffective, since groundwater levels within the slide mass are relatively low and high levels following precipitation events naturally drain from the fractured slide mass. Based on the conceptual costs for the construction of these remediation options, annual maintenance becomes a reasonable option.


